

## **APA – INTERNATIONAL STYLE FOR FORMATTING SCIENTIFIC PUBLICATIONS**

The APA style is a style for formatting author citations and bibliographic descriptions in the reference list. This style was developed for use in psychology, and was later adopted by other sciences. An APA style citation can be formatted in two ways: as an in-text citation at the appropriate place in the text of the document, and as an out-of-text list of sources for quotes or mentions.

### **Citations. General Provisions:**

In-text citation:

- if you frequently mention someone's work in your publication;
- if you directly quote someone's work;
- if you paraphrase someone.

An in-text citation includes:

- the surname of the author or authors (in the order they are listed in the actual publication), followed by the year of publication of the source;
- page or paragraph numbers for a direct quote and for paraphrasing, where appropriate.

The reference is placed immediately after the quoted text.

When citing or referencing a source that is cited in a second, secondary reference, indicate the source with the reference data of the secondary reference: for example, Smith (as cited in Jones, 2010).

### **Reference List. General Requirements:**

- the list of references should start on a new page and be given the title "References", which should be placed in the middle of the page;

- the list has a hanging indent and double spacing, where the first line of each reference is aligned to the left margin, while all subsequent lines are indented to the right. The indent should be 5–7 spaces or 1.25 cm. These parameters are set using text editors;
- all references from the reference list must be cited in the text;
- all references cited in the text must also be included in the reference list (exception – unpublished materials);
- references in the list are arranged in alphabetical order by the authors' surnames;
- where two titles with the same authors and the same date are given, a lowercase letter is added to the year of publication (e.g., 2003a, 2003b...);
- names of organizations are given in full unless they are widely known (e.g., APA for the American Psychological Association);
- full URLs should be shortened using appropriate programs (e.g., <https://hyperhost.ua/tools/uk/surli>);
- verify the basic details of the actual source – you confirm that you have read the source when you cite it;
- adhere to the chosen citation style throughout the entire publication.

**Digital Object Identifier (DOI) and URL**

The Digital Object Identifier (DOI) is a unique code and must be displayed in the reference if it is available. It is an alphanumeric code, usually found on the first page along with other elements provided in print and electronic resources. If the DOI identifier is missing, information about the URL link should be provided. The description of printed resources must also display the DOI identifier.

Multiple authors: ambiguous citations	For repeated citations of authors with identical surnames, add the surnames of co-authors to distinguish: ...(Brown, Smith, et al., 1998) to distinguish from (Brown, Taylor, et al., 1998).
Multiple works: one author	When citing together, display the author's surname, followed by the years of each publication, separated by a comma:

	... (Stairs, 1992, 1993) or Stairs (1992, 1993)...
Multiple works: one author and one year	<p><i>For multiple citations of the same author and the same year of publication, add a lowercase letter suffix to the years of publication (a, b, c, etc.). The assignment of suffixes is determined by the order of the references in the reference list. Suffixes are also included in the reference list, and these references are listed alphabetically by title. When citing multiple times in one place in the text, the list of suffixes is arranged as shown below.</i></p> <p>Stairs (1992b)... later in the text ... (Stairs, 1992a). ... Author – anonymous	<p>Use "Anonymous" as the author's name. ... (Anonymous, 1997).</p>

References to specific parts of a source	<p><i>Provide page numbers for direct quotes. Indicate the page, chapter, figure, table, etc., as precisely as possible. Citing secondary sources (i.e., a source mentioned in another publication)	<i>The list should only include details of the source you actually read – not the original source. ### Books and book chapters:

Edition: Information about the edition for the first edition is not provided.

Location of publication: In the USA, the location of the publisher should include the city name and the abbreviated state name; in other countries, it should include the city and country name. In the case of multiple places of publication, the first one in the list is displayed.

Electronic book  The URL should be the website address of the main publisher or provider. If the e-book is accessed from a catalog, check the bibliographic description in the catalog to determine the publisher or provider for full-text access.
